The Architectural Committee revised at the June 28, 2017 Board Meeting:

- Pistachia Chinensis (Dense shade, fall color, low litter)
- Quercus Virginiana (Heritage; Live Oak/Grows well in lawn area/clean tree)
- <u>Caesal Cascalote</u> (Low litter, stunning winter color)
- Ulmus Parvifolia (Evergreen Elm Ulmus; No thorns, Excellent Lawn Tree)
- Fruitless Olive (Olea Eurpea. Gray evergreen/low litter/ fruitless/clean)
- Fraxinus texensis (Texas Ash; Beautiful shade tree with a rounded crown that is reminiscent of a Chinese Pistachio.
- <u>Fraxinus velutina</u> (Fan-Tex Ash; Moderately to rapidly growing deciduous tree reaching 35 to 40 feet tall and wide. Requires full sun)
- <u>Fraxinus uhdei</u> (Shamel Ash; Fast-growing tree that can reach heights of up to 80 feet, with a spread of up to 60 feet. Considered an considered evergreen, though it may lose some leaves because of frost damage)
